I recently took up the role of treasurer on the Executive Committee.


I hope the work we do supports you, as members and whānau, to have what you need, to live the lives you want.

Prior to my MD symptoms I worked in various sectors such as the Defence Force, private medical practice, and education as an administrator.


I believe my role is to provide support for our members and their whānau.

<u>CMT Study - an update from Adam</u> <u>Philps, podiatrist.</u>

Following on from Adam's interesting article in our last newsletter. Adam has kindly supplied us with the abstract for the study.



3D-printed custom ankle braces for people with Charcot-Marie-Tooth: a pilot study

ABSTRACT

Background. Charcot Marie Tooth (CMT) is an inherited progressive neurodegenerative condition that can result in drop foot, changes in balance, and walking impairment. 3D-printed custom ankle braces are designed to improve ankle joint function and lateral ankle stability, however, their use in people with CMT has not been explored.

Aim. The aim of this feasibility study was to determine whether a 3D-printed custom ankle brace improves function and balance in people with CMT, and whether the device was acceptable for use in this population.

Methods. A 4-week intervention study was undertaken, recruiting people with physician diagnosed CMT in the Wellington region of New Zealand. All participants were fitted with a pair of custom ankle braces. Functional walking and balance tests, and patient-reported foot pain, disability and falls history were assessed before and after the intervention. Participants kept a daily diary recording hours worn and any adverse events. Patient-reported acceptability of the device was assessed post-intervention. Data were analysed using linear regression and results were adjusted for hours worn.

Results. Eleven people with CMT were included (mean age 48 years, 60% male). A statistically significant improvement was seen during single leg balance with eyes open (P=0.026) and a significant reduction in foot pain (P=0.045), following use of the ankle brace. Participants were moderately satisfied with the look and comfort of the brace.

Conclusion. A 3D-printed custom ankle brace may be an effective and acceptable therapeutic option to consider for some people with CMT who have foot drop and/or instability.
